Enforcement

Our trading standards team enforce a wide range of legislation aimed at protecting consumers or regulating the way businesses conduct themselves.

We work to prevent under-age sales, illegal trading practices, doorstep crime and the sale of unsafe or counterfeit goods.

To ensure compliance with the law regarding goods and services, we monitor the town's business activities by

- Sampling
- Test purchasing
- Visiting businesses and advising traders
- Investigating complaints
- Gathering intelligence

Doorstep crime

Trading standards need your help to tackle rogue traders

Rogue traders who cold-call are deceiving consumers, particularly the elderly and vulnerable, by taking their money and dignity which can severely affect their quality of life.

Doorstep crime can be defined as criminals cold-calling at the doors of residents, offering to carry out property repairs such as:

- Roofing work
- Clearing of guttering
- Fascia and soffit installation
- Tarmac of driveways
- General home improvement services

Doorstep crime can affect anyone however; rogue traders often prey on the most vulnerable in society.

The work carried out is often substandard and overpriced, including unnecessary repairs, the deliberate damage of property in order to acquire work, claims that work has been completed which has not been done and false declarations being made about the membership of trade associations and experience/ qualifications of the offenders.

The doorstep callers may use intimidating or aggressive tactics in order to frighten the person into contracting for services and parting with their money. Alternatively, the callers may befriend the vulnerable victim to facilitate the crime, which often results in repeat offending.

How can you help?

Raise awareness by talking to friends and relatives about doorstep crime in order to empower them and reduce their chances of becoming victims; The following tips will be useful points to discuss:

- Never agree to work that is instigated as a result of a cold-call or leaflet drop
- Consider whether the work is necessary or wanted. If so, obtain at least three written quotes from reputable businesses or traders who are members of the Blackpool Council safe and secure scheme
- Report an unwanted caller to trading standards on 01253 478375

Single-use vape ban

From 1 June 2025, it will be illegal for businesses to sell or supply, offer to sell or supply, or have in their possession for sale or supply all single-use or disposable vapes. This applies to:

- Sales online and in shops
- All single-use /disposable vapes whether or not they contain nicotine

Blackpool trading standards will be able to seize any single-use vapes they find and could then issue the business selling the single-use vape with a fine of £200. If you continue to supply, offer to supply or have in your possession for supply single-use vapes, you may be prosecuted; and upon conviction sentenced to an unlimited fine, a prison sentence of up to 2 years, or both.

What to do if you have stock of single-use vapes

If you still have single-use vapes in your possession from 1 June 2025, you will not be able to sell or supply them to customers.

You'll need to arrange for these vapes to be recycled. If you have vape bin services, you should do this through the company they provide – you may need to pay a fee.

To prepare for the ban, you should:

- Stop buying new stock of single-use vapes
- Sell through all existing stock

- Buy vapes that follow the new regulations

From 1 June 2025, if you possess any leftover single-use vaping products, you'll need to:

- Separate them from other goods
- Label them as unsellable
- Remove them from your shop floor or online store until they've been collected by a registered vape recycling service
